
BACKGROUND ON THE 2021 STRATEGIC PLAN

SESWA Board of Directors, key leaders and management staff have taken time to review and update the Strategic Plan in 2021. To assist in this process an independent, professional facilitator was hired to gather and organize everyone's thoughts and ideas.

Four key focus areas were identified and goals, strategies and tactics were created.

- Focus Areas are high-priority items to focus effort on in working toward a vision.
- **Goals** are an organization's measurable objectives that are indicative of its long-term vision.
- Strategies are the means or techniques by which Goals may be attained.
- **Tactics** are the ways in which a Goal or Strategy would be accomplished. Tactics may be either measurable or observable, or both.

The SESWA Executive Committee will identify which goals and strategies to focus on each year to further SESWA's mission. These annual goals will create an Action Plan that will be provided to the Board of Directors and Committees to implement.





SESWA's MISSION

To assist stormwater professionals in the southeast as they seek solutions to surface water quality and stormwater management challenges.

SESWA's PURPOSE

- Provide education and training for stormwater professionals.
- Advocate for the interests of stormwater programs in the decision-making processes of regulatory agencies and the courts.
- Research, collect, and distribute information about stormwater management practices, water quality, and the creation/operation of stormwater utilities and other financing mechanisms.

1. FOCUS AREA: ORGANIZATIONAL MODEL

Southeast Stormwater Association Board of Directors' Meeting Minutes - Draft April 22, 2021 Online Meeting Via Zoom Meetings

SESWA President Scott Hofer called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. In attendance were Scott Hofer (Jefferson County DOH, AL); Cory Rayburn (City of Atlanta, GA); W. Dave Canaan (Mecklenburg County, NC); Laurie Hawks (Hawks Environmental, GA); Synithia Williams (Richland County, SC); Patrick Blandford (HDR); John Butler (Gwinnett County, GA); Aaron Dockery (City of Somerset, KY); Barrett Fisher (Hamilton County, TN); Rosemary Ginn (City of Mobile, AL); Katie Beth Jennings (Columbia County, GA); Demetria Kimball-Mehlhorn (Lexington Fayette Urban County, KY); Kevin Kubiak (Berkeley County, SC); Milton Leggett (City of Stuart, FL); David Mason (CDM Smith); Kristen O'Reilly (City of Charlotte, NC); Steven Peene (Applied Technology & Management); Hillary Repik (Town of Mount Pleasant, SC); and Danielle Hopkins, Rhea Oaks, Lynn Buchanan and Diane Morrill-Murphy (management staff).

1. Welcome and Introductions

Scott Hofer welcomed the Board of Directors and thanked everyone for attending the meeting. Each member introduced themselves.

2. Review Board of Directors Duties

Scott Hofer reviewed the Board of Directors Guidelines and Expectations document which outlines the duties and expectations of the Board of Directors. Mr. Hofer encouraged all members to promote and participate in all Association activities.

3. Review Governing Documents

Danielle Hopkins reviewed the following Governing Documents which were included in the meeting packet:

- Operating Protocols Policies and procedures by which the Association functions.

 Operating Protocols are approved and revised by the Board of Directors.
- Strategic Plan Adopted by the Board of Directors and identifies the Association's Goals for the next five years; the Strategies or means by which the Goals may be attained; and the Indicators by which it may be determined if a Goal or Strategy is being accomplished.
- **Action Plan -** Developed by the President from the Strategic Plan and approved by the Executive Committee annually. It focuses on priorities for the coming year.

Ms. Hopkins reviewed and requested approval for the following Policy additions:

- Harassment Policy which would formalize SESWA's zero-tolerance policy of discriminatory or harassing conduct. A copy of the policy was included in the meeting packet.
- Privacy Policy which would formalize SESWA's current practices of collecting and safeguarding personal information. A draft policy was provided in the meeting packet.

A motion was made to approve the addition of the Harassment Policy and the Privacy Policy as presented. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

4. Approve October 2020 Meeting Minutes

A motion was made to approve the minutes of the October 2, 2020 Board of Directors Meeting. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

5. Review Action Items from Last Meeting

Danielle Hopkins reported the status of the action items from the October 2020 Board of Directors meeting and actions taken by the Executive Committee since the October 2020 meeting.

Action Items from the October 2020 Board of Directors Meeting

- Management Staff Out of Scope A final accounting of time spent out of the Scope of Work for the 2020 Annual Conference was provided in the meeting packet.
- Strategic Planning Management staff worked with the Facilitator, Brian Riggs, to transition
 the Strategic Planning Exercise from an in-person to an online format. Management staff
 collected additional input from SESWA leadership related to the pandemic. Online meetings
 were created for April 14th, 15th & 28th, but the meeting scheduled for April 28th was not
 needed. The final Plan is expected in June.
- 2021 Stormwater Utility Report Management staff conducted the 2021 Survey of Stormwater
 Utilities in the Southeast. Data was collected, the 2021 Southeast Stormwater Utility Report
 was constructed and produced on USB wafers. All members and non-members who completed
 a Survey received a complimentary copy of the Report. The Report is also available online.

Executive Committee Actions since October 2020

• Following SESWA's *State-Specific Policy Issues* protocol, a request for involvement to oppose pending state legislation in Tennessee was presented to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee approved the request for an amount not to exceed \$1,500. A copy of SESWA's letter was provided in the meeting packet. After the legislation received push back from multiple agencies in Tennessee and SESWA, the Bill was withdrawn and sent to summer study. Actual time spent out of the Scope of Work totaled \$800.

6. Approve Finance Report

A Finance Report for the first nine months of FY 2020-21 comparing the adopted budget with actual income and expense was included in the meeting packet. Danielle Hopkins presented the report.

Ms. Hopkins noted the following significant observations:

- Dues income exceeded budget by \$15,131. As of March 31, 2021, there were 183 organizational members, including 16 new member organizations. Detailed information was provided in the Membership Committee's section of the meeting packet.
- The 2021 Southeast Stormwater Utility Report budget anticipates breaking even with both income and expense totaling \$5,000. Actual sponsor income was \$2,500 with three sponsors (CBI Systems, CDM Smith, and McGill Associates.)
- Net income from the online 2020 Annual Conference was \$70,722, or \$33,072 more than budget. The Conference budget anticipated an in-person event, however, due to the pandemic the Conference was hosted online. The online Conference generated higher than anticipated attendee and sponsor participation and the expenses were minimized by hosting the Conference in the Zoom platform. A separate Conference finance report, not including compensation for time management staff spent out of the Scope of Work, for the Annual Conference was provided in the meeting packet.
- The 2021 Seminar anticipated to meet and exceed budget. An up-to -date finance report for the Seminar was emailed to members of the Board of Directors prior to the meeting. The 2021 Seminar budget anticipated an in-person event, however, the Seminar transitioned to an online format. Actual income and expense will be finalized at the end of April 2021.
- The 2021 Spotlight Webinar is budgeted to break even with a minimum expectation of 50 registrants. As of the meeting, there were 19 registrations. The members were encouraged to promote the Webinar.
- Due to the pandemic the Strategic Planning exercise was rescheduled to FY 2020-21 to be held in conjunction with the April 2021 meetings. All expenses will be finalized by the end of this fiscal year.
- The Litigation Fund had no income or expense reported in FY 2020-21. A Litigation Fund finance report was included in the meeting packet.

Ms. Hopkins reported that as of March 31, 2021, SESWA had a cash balance of \$292,746 plus \$323 in prepaid expenses and total retained earnings of \$202,586. SESWA financial policies require the maintenance of cash reserves equal to the amount of expenditures necessary for the operation of the Association for three months. For FY 2020-21, three months of general operating costs equal \$37,149; the Association's unrestricted reserves are \$165,345.

A detailed accounting and summary report of the time spent out of the Scope of Work since the last Board of Directors meeting in October 2020 was provided in the meeting packet and reviewed. Ms. Hopkins noted:

- The 2020 Annual Conference transitioned to an online format. Approval was requested for compensation for the time that management staff spent out of the Scope of Work in the amount of \$6,725.00.
- The 2021 Seminar also transitioned to an online format, but additional time spent out of the Scope of Work did not exceed the time that management staff would have spent traveling to the in-person event. Additional compensation was not requested for the 2021 Spring Seminar.

A motion was made to approve the Quarter III, FY 2020-21 Finance Report as presented and to approve \$6,725.00 in compensation for time spent out of the Scope of Work as requested. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

7. Approve Proposed FY 2021-22 Budget

A copy of the Proposed Budget for FY 2021-22 was provided in the meeting packet. The document included four columns for comparison purposes: actual income and expense through the 3rd Quarter; the current year's budget; projections through the end of the year; and the Proposed Budget for FY 2021-22. Danielle Hopkins reported that FY 2020-2021 was projected to end with a \$40,000 profit, or \$56,850 more than budget.

Ms. Hopkins noted the following reasons for the increase in net profit.

- The budget anticipated a reduction in membership renewals; however, a focused effort to retain members resulted in high retention rates.
- There was more participation at the 2020 Annual Conference than anticipated along with lower costs to host the online event.
- The 2021 Spring Seminar also projected higher participation and lower expenses because of the online format.

Danielle Hopkins reported that the Proposed Budget was developed based on the following assumptions:

[General]

- Membership dues income projects a 5% decrease from this fiscal year's actual income due to the uncertainty of pandemic recovery.
- AMP is not asking for a 3% cost of living adjustment this year.
- The amount provided under "AMP-Other" is an estimate of time that would be needed beyond the current management staff Scope of Work to host the 2021 Annual Conference in an online format.

[Education]

- 2021 Annual Conference net income assumes the Conference will be hosted online with an estimated net profit of \$59,300.
- 2022 Spring Seminar net income is based on projections for an in-person event returning to the Westin Perimeter North in Atlanta, GA.

[Litigation]

• No income or expense is budgeted for litigation/advocacy. Any expenditure related to litigation/advocacy must be approved in advance by the Executive Committee.

Ms. Hopkins noted that while the Proposed Budget anticipates that the 2021 Annual Conference will be an online event, further discussion and feedback from the Board of Directors was encouraged. Should SESWA choose to host the event in-person, using social distancing requirements and travel safety protocols, it is anticipated that the event would not generate a net profit needed for the annual budget to breakeven, thus requiring the use of the Association's reserves. Ms. Hopkins noted that historically, net profit from SESWA's Education events has contributed to more than half of the Association's income. A discussion ensued.

An online survey of the Board of Directors was conducted via Zoom to determine the likelihood of attendance to an in-person event and the level of financial impact they would be comfortable approving if needed.

Based on the survey results, Ms. Hopkins recommended that the Board of Directors approve the Proposed Budget as presented and postpone the final decision on conference format until early June to survey the membership as to whether they would attend an in-person Annual Conference in Hilton Head, SC in October 2021.

A decision was made for management staff to survey the SESWA membership and provide a summary of the results to the Executive Committee to make the final decision on whether the 2021 Annual Conference would be in-person or online.

A motion was made to approve the FY 2021-2022 budget as presented with the Annual Conference as an online event and to give the Executive Committee the authority to change the format to an in-person event based on the information collected from the Board of Directors poll and the membership survey.

Task Assignments:

• Management staff to develop and distribute a survey to the membership to determine their ability to attend the Annual Conference as an in-person vs. online event.

• Executive Committee to review the Board of Directors survey along with the membership survey to make a final decision on the format for the 2021 Annual Conference.

8. Committee Updates

Communications

Kevin Kubiak, Communications Committee Chair, gave the report. Mr. Kubiak reported the Committee reviewed the committee responsibilities and discussed ways to increase participation in the Community Forum and contributions to the *ForeCast eNewsletter*. The Committee reviewed the distribution data of the Community Forum and the *ForeCast eNewsletter* promotions. Mr. Kubiak reported both promotions had open rates of 25% or more. The Committee agreed to continue to investigate ways to enhance the *ForeCast eNewsletter*. Mr. Kubiak thanked the Board of Directors for their participation in the Community Forum and asked for their continued commitment. Mr. Kubiak provided an update on the State Liaison effort to cultivate increased participation in the bi-monthly networking call and contributions to the eNewsletter. Don Green, TN, Joe Fersner, SC and Scott Hofer, AL agreed to serve as State Liaisons.

Conference and Education

Demetria Kimball-Mehlhorn, Conference and Education Committee Chair, gave the report. Ms. Kimball-Mehlhorn reported that the Committee reviewed the evaluations from the 2020 Annual Conference, and assignments for the upcoming 2021 Annual Conference. The Committee reviewed updates and assignment for the 2021 Spring Seminar and discussed potential topics for the 2022 Spring Seminar. The Committee reviewed the January and May 2021 webinars and discussed potential topics for the July 2021 webinar.

Membership

Danielle Hopkins gave the report on behalf of the Membership Committee Chair, Angela Moss. Ms. Hopkins reported the Committee reviewed membership numbers, stating at the time of the meeting there were 184 members and 17 new members. The Committee discussed recruitment efforts, the creation of a prospect list by state, and agreed to continue to follow up with those who

make inquires and prospects that attend SESWA events. The Committee reviewed the Welcome Program assignments and agreed to continue to contact new members to welcome them to the Association.

Stormwater Policy

Katie Beth Jennings, Stormwater Policy Committee Chair, gave the report of the Committee's actions. Ms. Jennings reported the Committee discussed WOTUS and the Committee expressed interest in SESWA's continued involvement in monitoring the issue. The Committee discussed PFAS, their sources and the impact. The Committee also discussed the impacts of the Maui decision, noting the plans to implement regulations by EPA are on hold. The Committee reviewed the Southeast MS4 Permit Database and Committee members accepted assignments by state to review and report and provide updates to management staff.

Ms. Jennings reported that based on an idea from the March Networking Call, the Committee discussed the benefit of developing a one-page educational Stormwater Utilities Factsheet highlighting the benefits of a Stormwater Utility Program. An Ad-Hoc Committee was formed to develop the Factsheet including Damien Di Vittorio, Steve Leo, Dave Mason, and Steven Peene.

Laurie Hawks gave a summary report of the EPA EFAB Stormwater Finance Report. The Report reviewed the source of funding, how the sources impact affordability and whether the sources are sufficient to fund stormwater programs for local governments. Ms. Hawks reported the findings of the Report stated the current resources were not sufficient to meet the needs for infrastructure and the additional needs of Stormwater Programs. Katie Beth Jennings submitted a motion from the Committee to approve an advocacy initiative to promote stormwater funding for infrastructure programs. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously. Four suggested initiatives include:

- 1. Reaching out to other organizations to work together.
- 2. Write a short white paper on select recommendations.
- 3. Write a letter to select legislators.
- 4. Encourage local governments with lobbyists to support this effort.

An Ad-Hoc Committee was formed including Damien Di Vittorio, Laurie Hawks, Steve Leo, and Cory Rayburn.

Task Assignments

- SWU Factsheet Ad-Hoc Committee and management staff to develop a one-page educational Stormwater Utilities Factsheet highlighting the benefits of a Stormwater Utility Program.
- Stormwater Infrastructure Funding Ad-Hoc Committee and management staff to develop a white paper and letter to Congress.

9. Litigation Update

Danielle Hopkins reported SESWA and its partner associations' challenge to the 2015 WOTUS rule in the Federal District Court for the Northern District of Florida was closed but may be reactivated if EPA's 2020 Repeal Rule is not upheld in court, or challenges to the 2015 rules in other parts of the country do not prevail. She stated that the election of a new Administration in November 2020 made predicting the final definitions of what is or is not a Water of the United States even more difficult. Ms. Hopkins stated that SESWA will continue to monitor developments and litigation pertaining to WOTUS. She reminded the Board of Directors that the cost of the effort in Florida District Court has been capped at a total of \$25,000 with SESWA's total share being \$5,000; and that this amount has been paid.

10. Next Board of Directors Meeting

Scott Hofer reported the next scheduled meeting of the Board of Directors would be in conjunction with the 2021 Annual Conference. The meeting would be held on Wednesday, October 6, 2021 if the Conference is held in Hilton Head, SC. It was also noted that if the Conference is held online the meeting would take place on Friday, October 1, 2021.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 11:40 a.m. Eastern Time.

4. Review Actions from Last Meeting

Action Items from April 2021 Meeting

Harassment Policy and Privacy Policy – Management staff implemented the policies as approved by the Board of Directors

Strategic Plan – Leadership met online April 14 and 15, 2021 for the Strategic Planning exercise. The final Plan was approved by the Board of Directors in September.

Executive Committee Actions since April 2021

- The Executive Committee met on July 9, 2021 for their regularly scheduled quarterly association review. The agenda included a review of financial statements, the strategic plan, membership, an update on the 2021 the Annual Conference and discussions about the 2022 Annual Conference venue, and leadership development.
- The Executive Committee met August 25, 2021 to discuss the 2021 Annual Conference. Due to COVID-19 the Executive Committee unanimously approved management staff's recommendation to change the platform of the 2021 Annual Conference to an online format including all October meetings and the Annual Membership Meeting.

5. Approve Finance Report*

Attached please find a Finance Report generated by our accounting software for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020 and ending June 30, 2021. The End of Year Report compares the adopted budget with actual income and expense and is formatted to allow comparison of income and expense by budget category: General; Publications; Education; and, Legal/Advocacy.

The adopted budget for FY 2020-21 projected a net loss of \$16,775, however the year ended with a net income of \$59,491. This is a difference of \$76,266 more than budget. The change from a net loss to a net profit is primarily due to membership income and net income from the 2020 Annual Conference and 2021 Spring Seminar.

Significant observations are as follows:

- [INCOME/GENERAL/Dues] Dues income was \$107,225, which is \$15,256 more than the budget. There were 186 member organizations as of June 30, 2021. See the attached Membership History report for additional information.
- [INCOME/PUBLICATIONS/Survey Report Sponsor] The 2021 Southeast Stormwater Utility Report was completed this fiscal year with distribution in April 2021. The budget anticipated breaking even with both income and expense totaling \$5,000. Actual income totaled \$2,500 with expenses of \$2,321.
- [INCOME & EXPENSE/EDUCATION/Annual Conference] The 2020 Annual Conference was planned to be held in-person in Hilton Head Island, SC with a net profit of \$37,650. The estimated net income after transitioning the Conference online was anticipated to be \$37,735, however due to higher attendee and sponsor participation net income exceeded budget by \$33,072. A separate Finance Report for the 2020 Annual Conference is attached. A current Finance Report for the 2021 Annual Conference will be distributed during the meeting.

- [INCOME & EXPENSE/EDUCATION/Spring Seminar] The 2021 Spring Seminar was also planned to be held in-person in Atlanta, GA. Net profit was estimated to be \$10,500. The estimated net income after transitioning the Seminar online was anticipated to be \$19,180. Actual net income was \$22,284, or \$11,784 more than budget. A Finance Report for the 2021 Spring Seminar is attached.
- [INCOME & EXPENSE/EDUCATION/Spotlight Webinar] The concept of SESWA's State "Spotlight" Webinar was suggested four years ago by the Membership Committee as a way to reach out to potential members. The goal of these webinars is to raise awareness of the Association and its services by focusing content and attendance in one state in the Southeast. The 2021 State Spotlight webinar was focused on content and participants in Florida and incurred a net income of \$295.
- [EXPENSE/GENERAL/Board of Directors] Due to the transition of the April meetings to an online format, there was no dinner for the Board of Directors. As a result, the Board of Directors expense was reduced by approximately \$4,000.
- [EXPENSE/GENERAL/AMP Other] An additional \$6,725 was allocated by the Board of Directors for time spent by AMP for work performed out of scope for transitioning and hosting the 2020 Annual Conference online.
- [EXPENSE/STRATEGIC PLANNING/Strategic Planning 2019-20] The Strategic Planning exercise was postponed to April 2021. All expenses for this exercise have been billed.

At the end of fiscal year 2020-21 SESWA's retained assets were \$202,586, of which \$92 is restricted by Board policy for advocacy/litigation purposes.

Reserves and Assets

As of June 30, 2021, SESWA had a balance of \$340,360 in its checking account, plus \$623 in pre-paid expenses. SESWA had total retained earnings (reserves) of \$202,586.

SESWA financial policies require the maintenance of cash reserves equal to the amount of expenditures necessary for the operation of the Association for three months (general expenses only – Publications, Education and Legal are not included) based on the current budget. For fiscal year 2020-21, three months of general operating costs total \$37,149; the Association's unrestricted reserves are \$202,494.

FY 2021-22 Updates

As of September 20, 2021 SESWA has 176 members and \$107,000 in membership dues income. The adopted budget anticipates dues income of \$101,745. As previously stated, a detailed 2021 Annual Conference budget will be provided at the Board meeting.

PCI Compliance Report

All of the Association's credit card transactions occur through third party software. The providers of this software are maintaining a Level 1 Payment Card Industry (PCI) Data Security Standard. Management staff has authenticated that all security measures have been met and have compliance security measures in place.

Compensation Policy

The protocol for management company compensation notes that any time spent out of scope is to be reported at each meeting of the Board of Directors. AMP is currently tracking out of scope time for the 2021 Annual Conference and will present final numbers at the April 2022 Board of Directors meeting.



WOTUS Update

A federal district court in South Carolina has granted EPA and the Army Corps of Engineers' request to remand the previous Administration's 2020 definition of waters of the United States (WOTUS) for further revision but declined to vacate the rule itself. Vacating the 2020 rule would have resulted in the reinstatement of the 2015 WOTUS policies. Remanding the rule in effect grants the new Administration more time to develop its own WOTUS definitions. The Court's ruling carries no binding precedent but may be viewed as being "persuasive" in other jurisdictions. Visit SESWA's Advocacy_page for WOTUS timeline and summary of impacts.

Wastewater Discharge Required to Obtain Surface Water Permit

The wastewater treatment (WWT) plant in Maui County (Hawaii) is now being required to obtain a Clean Water Act (CWA) permit to govern discharge of treated wastewater into injection wells that eventually finds its way to a jurisdictional waterbody - the Pacific Ocean. This is the first time that the US Supreme Court's decision requiring surface water permits for pollutants that travel through groundwater emerge in surface waters or where there is a functional equivalent of a direct discharge to a WOTUS waterbody. The decision will likely have implications for other WWT and similar discharges, such as those from animal feeding operations and coal ash disposal sites.

Construction General Permit Revisions

The window to comment on <u>proposed revisions</u> to the NPDES general permit for stormwater discharges from construction activities has now closed. Sometimes referred to as the Construction General Permit (CGP) the current permit will expire in February of 2022. Infrastructure Funding Bills Advance

There has been much discussion in the media concerning the efforts of Congress to provide more funding for infrastructure. As of the publication of this newsletter, three bills are the primary vehicles for changes and increases in funding during this Session of Congress.

HR 3684 (INVEST in America Act) is a \$715B surface transportation and water infrastructure bill that has passed the House. It addresses provisions related to federal-aid highway, transit, highway safety, motor carrier, research, hazardous materials, and rail programs of the Department of Transportation (DOT). It extends funding for federal-aid highway, transit, and safety programs; reauthorizes several surface transportation programs, including the federal-aid highway program, transit programs, highway safety, motor carrier safety, and rail programs; addresses climate change through strategies to the impacts on surface transportation systems; and includes vulnerability assessments to identify opportunities to enhance the resilience of the surface transportation system and ensure the efficient use of federal resources.

HR 1915 (Water Quality Protection and Job Creation Act of 2021) creates or reauthorizes several grant programs for infrastructure to treat water pollution, such as wastewater or stormwater. It reauthorizes programs to control water pollution and pilot projects to address wet weather discharges and authorizes alternative water source projects and measures to manage, treat or recapture stormwater. Lastly, the legislation requires EPA to award grants to owners of publicly owned treatment works for the treatment of perfluoroalkyl or polyfluoroalkyl (PFAS). HR 1915 has passed out of committee and is on the House Calendar. It would provide about \$40B over five years for the Clean Water State Revolving Fund programs.

<u>S 914</u> (Drinking Water and Wastewater Infrastructure Act of 2021) reauthorizes or establishes a variety of programs for water infrastructure. It supports programs to provide safe drinking water or to treat wastewater, such as sewer overflows or stormwater. It reauthorizes and revises the clean water state revolving fund (SRF) and the drinking water SRF. S 914 has passed the Senate and would provide about \$35B in new funding for water infrastructure.

Around the Southeast

Leveraging CWSRF Funding for Stormwater Infrastructure

Did you know State Revolving Fund programs have a <u>Green Project Reserve (GPR)</u> that is 10% of a state's annual Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) allotment; that most states have a lower interest rate for GPR projects; and that most don't get enough GPR applications to fully utilize it? So how do you leverage these funds for stormwater needs? First, know how your state prioritizes GPR projects. All prioritize projects that utilize green infrastructure and have water quality benefits but understanding your specific state's criteria and how to gain the maximum points is important. For instance, intersections with impaired waters and total maximum daily load (TMDL) implementation will garner more points. Second, develop a stormwater Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) that allows annual prioritization of needs and identification of projects that will be most competitive for outside funding. Third, know your state's application deadlines and what is required. Each state has a different schedule and process that may impact when you need to apply and the level of detail required. Finally, apply for these funds when you have an eligible project! Only GPR projects compete for these funds and each year this funding resource for stormwater projects goes largely untapped.

Florida Mandates 20-Year Stormwater Needs Assessment

<u>House Bill 53</u> passed during the recently completed 2021 Legislative Session and requires local governments with wastewater or stormwater management systems to create a 20-year needs analysis for those systems. The analysis must include a description of the system, the number of future residents served, revenues and expenditures, maintenance costs, etc. The compiled information will be filed with the Legislature's <u>Office of Economic and Demographic Research</u> (EDR). The first analysis is due on June 20, 2022, and every five years thereafter. EDR is currently refining the survey instrument that will be used to gather information.

EPA Sends Integrated Planning Report to Congress Emphasizing Clear Municipal and Water Quality Benefits

After much anticipation, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) on July 12, 2021 finalized and sent its <u>Report to Congress on Integrated Plans to Comply with the Water Infrastructure Improvement Act (WIIA) of 2019</u> to both the Senate's Committee on Environment and Public Works and the House's Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure. The Report is now publicly available on EPA's <u>Integrated Planning</u> website.

NACWA has long supported EPA's integrated planning framework and as a result of advocacy efforts alongside other municipal and water sector partners, Congress codified Integrated Planning (IP) into the Clean Water Act (CWA) in January 2019—a monumental revision to the Act that can significantly help communities prioritize actions with the most meaningful water quality benefits while simultaneously recognizing a community's affordability constraints.

Congress directed EPA to develop this Report to track nationwide IP implementation and to further examine the costs, control measures, and compliance schedules of those communities that have effectively pursued IP. EPA highlights in the Report a total of 27 municipalities that have developed an integrated plan, including 13 integrated plans that are part of a CWA National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permitting scheme, an administrative order, or a consent decree.

While there is tremendous variability between community needs and specific CWA drivers, EPA's Report notes that on average the cost to implement an integrated plan can range from \$15 million to \$2 billion, with an average of \$745 million. EPA also highlights in the Report that, of the integrated plans that are part of a CWA obligation and not a volunteer effort, communities are mostly using an integrated plan to address CSOs and SSOs and further progress on stormwater management. It is important to note that the compliance schedules for those integrated plans EPA discusses are long-term, with an average compliance schedule of 21 years.

EPA's Report exemplifies how an integrated plan can present a community with considerable cost-saving opportunities as well as provide significant water quality improvements beyond what a

singular improvement project could achieve. This information will be tremendously helpful to other municipalities looking to integrate a more flexible process to address water quality challenges in their community and best prioritize key dollars accordingly. At the same time, it is clear that more can be done at the local, state, and federal level to continue promoting IP and make it easier for more communities to take advantage of it.

Since publishing its <u>2012 Integrated Planning Framework</u>, EPA has demonstrated its continued support for municipal clean water utilities seeking to develop and implement an integrated plan. NACWA is encouraged by EPA's work done to date and supports EPA providing critical communication and assistance as communities begin to conceptualize an IP framework.

To help further IP progress across the country, EPA has partnered with the Environmental Finance Centers of the University of Maryland and University of North Carolina to provide a complimentary technical assistance program to review integrated plans and provide critical feedback. NACWA encourages communities seeking feedback on developing an integrated plan to take advantage of this technical assistance through the end of August 2021.

Recruitment Call Strategy

1. Introduce yourself and establish rapport.

Let them know you are following up on a letter they should have just received.

- ✓ Ask them if they have any questions.
- ✓ Focus on finding common ground to help them realize you share common interest.

2. Focus on the contact's immediate needs and aspirations – listen for their "hot button" or passion.

A "hot button" represents an issue needing immediate attention. Whatever the need is, the answer can be found through involvement in one of the association's many programs/services or by connecting with another member.

- ✓ The sooner you discover what their key issues are, the sooner you can match needs with membership benefits
- ✓ Spend a bit of time showing how other programs/services can help them meet their long term needs
- ✓ Supplement the discussion by sharing how participation in various activities/connections has made a difference for you.

3. Extend an invitation to join; avoid a sales pitch.

Be enthusiastic and genuine when extending the invitation. Be direct that your association is interested in their well-being first. Make sure they realize that in this association, they are more than a number. They are a part of a professional community. Being a member offers them an opportunity to connect in meaningful ways with others. Be a peer mentor – help another member overcome their hurdles. Reflect on how important that is for the professional community to advance...to build and maintain the reputation for representing the best in the business.

4. Answer questions, neutralize objections, and reinforce the value of membership.

Expect some pessimism and hesitancy – they may have had other experiences that were not positive.

- ✓ Continue to share your experience and confidence that membership in this association is unlike others that you have had.
- ✓ Reinforce that fact by sharing the unexpected yet positive things you have experienced throughout your membership (see back of this piece for suggestions for handling common objections).

5. If more time is needed to decide; summarize the conversation, extend the invitation again, and set a convenient time to reconnect.

Leave them with just the facts that pertain to them and the benefits of joining.

- ✓ Reinforce the idea that they've been specially selected to be invited because of who they are and how they can contribute to the profession.
- ✓ Reach out again as promised. Answer questions affirming that you'll help them make their important first connections.

2015 Revisions to "Waters of the United States" Impacts on Local Governments

In 2015 EPA and the USACE finalized a rule updating the definitions of what constitutes "Waters of the United States" or those waters that are subject to the provisions of the federal Clean Water Act and related regulatory policies. This paper provides a short summary of the rule and its impacts on local governments.

The 2015 WOTUS rule was intended to clarify confusion created by conflicting court cases. But it did so by broadly expanding definitions of jurisdictional waters. Numerous additional waterbodies were subjected to the provisions of the CWA and therefore NPDES permitting requirements for discharges to surface waters. The rule also expanded the basis for the jurisdiction of the USACE's wetlands permitting program and evaluations under the Endangered Species Act.

SESWA's concerns with the 2015 rule are that it is so expansive it will force the diversion of scarce resources to a significantly broadened number of waters at the expense of those where there is a realistic chance of seeing improvements from targeted water quality improvement programs for human and/or environmental benefit.

The best approach for understanding the impact of the 2015 definitions is to think of it as a series of criteria, moving from large to smaller waterbodies:

- 1. First, the rule identifies a group of waters that can be used in **interstate commerce**, including interstate waters and wetlands, those subject to the ebb and flow of tide, etc.
- 2. Next the rule includes all "tributaries" to those Interstate Commerce Waters as identified above.
- 3. Next the rule includes waters that are "adjacent" to Interstate Commerce Waters or Tributaries, including:
 - ✓ All wetlands within, abutting or connecting the Ordinary High Water Mark of an Interstate Commerce Water or Tributary
 - ✓ All waters within 100 feet of Interstate Commerce Waters or Tributaries
 - ✓ All waters within 1,500 feet of the high tide line of an Interstate Commerce Water
- 4. Finally, the rule includes waters for which a "significant nexus" test applies, primarily to waters within the 100-year floodplain of an Interstate Commerce Water or within 4,000 feet of a high tide mark or Ordinary High Water Mark, if the water has a significant nexus to an Interstate Commerce Water. A significant nexus exists when a water "significantly affects" the biological, chemical or physical integrity of an Interstate Commerce Water.
 - Adjacency and Significant Nexus are the most expansive policies of the 2015 Rule.
- 5. There are a number of **exceptions** to the 2015 WOTUS rule, including prior converted crop lands, erosional features that don't form tributaries, puddles, certain stormwater control features, ditches with ephemeral flow, ditches with intermittent flow that don't drain wetlands or ditches that don't contribute flow into an Interstate Commerce Water, and a series of wastewater exclusions.

Why Should My Community Consider a Stormwater Utility?







What is a Stormwater Utility?

A stormwater utility (SWU) serves a number of functions; it provides a funding method; it is a program within a municipality; and it is an entity that manages the stormwater program. A SWU is similar to other utilities that charge users fees for services. In a SWU, users are those who generate stormwater runoff, and the services are to support stormwater management and NPDES permitting requirements. A SWU raises funds to support the stormwater program. Typically, the funding is based on fees that are applied to different users and land use types within the incorporated area.

SWU's: Funding your Stormwater Program

pay less.

Communities commonly fund stormwater management services via revenues from property taxes, water and sewer fees, sales taxes, or SWU's. However, SWU's offer several benefits over these other funding sources.

Predictable Annual Revenues: As opposed to sales taxes, SWU revenues are based on an established rate allowing annual revenues to be easily predicted. This in turn allows a utility the benefit of being able to develop long term capital improvement plans and move from a reactive to proactive management strategy.

Equitable Distribution of Cost: As opposed to property taxes, a SWU distributes the cost amongst all customers based on an assessment of the amount of stormwater runoff generated from a particular property. In this way it operates as a "user pays" system. Larger properties with more pavement, roofs, and other impervious surfaces create more stormwater

runoff, and subsequently pay more, while properties with lesser amounts of impervious surface

Transparency: Similar to other utility fees such as water, sewer, gas, and electricity, SWU fee revenues are used solely to address stormwater related problems such as flood control, storm drain repairs, and water quality management. This allows the public to see a clearly defined benefit directly associated with the fee.

Affordable: SWU fees are amongst the cheapest of all utility fees. According to SESWA's 2021 Southeast Stormwater Utility Report, which relies on survey responses from SWU's located throughout the Southeastern US, the average monthly SWU in 2021 was \$4.52.

7. Litigation Report

Waters of the United States

In August a federal District Court in Arizona remanded the 2020 Navigable Waters Protection Rule which significantly narrowed the definitions of water of the United States back to EPA and ACOE for review and revision. The Arizona court also vacated (invalidated) the rule on the basis of it being arbitrary and capricious. While other courts have already remanded the rule back to the agencies (and still others have rejected such requests) none have yet vacated the rule, which nullifies the rule. Many lawyers and the Administration are interpreting the Arizona decision as having a nationwide application.

A second question in front of the Arizona court is whether the 2019 "Repeal Rule" which repealed the 2015 Clean Water Rule is also arbitrary and capricious. The court has not yet ruled on that question.

Vacating the 2020 rule while letting the 2019 Repeal rule stand has the effect of moving WOTUS policy back to that which existed in the early 2000's. But vacating both the 2020 and 2019 rules has the effect of reinstating the 2015 rules. See attached table.

Remember that SESWA, FSA and others challenged the 2015 rule due to its extremely broad scope and fiscal impact on local governments. SESWA and its partners had agreed to voluntarily hold the case in abeyance after the adoption of the 2019 and 2020 rules.

After the August decision of the Arizona Court, SESWA and its local government partners had received the attached Order from Judge Walker in Tallahassee seeking our advice as to how to proceed. Counsel has conferred with lawyers from DOJ in their capacity as counsel to EPA and ACOE. A response is being drafted that asks the Court to keep the case administratively closed for another three months but with Plaintiffs having the option of asking this Court to re-open the case should the 2015 WOTUS Rule again become effective. DOJ and EPA have agreed to the Response. Management staff will keep the SESWA leadership informed.

SESWA completed its Strategic Planning exercise in 2021. The Strategic Plan was adopted by the Board of Directors and identifies the Association's Goals for the next five years; the Strategies or means by which the Goals may be attained; and the Tactics by which a Goal or Strategy may be accomplished. A copy of the Strategic Plan is enclosed.

Action Plan

The Action Plan is proposed by the President and approved by the Executive Committee annually. It focuses on priorities for the coming year, which are drawn from the Strategic Plan. The adopted Action Plan for 2022 is enclosed.

Operating Protocols

1. Duties of Officers and Board Members

Purpose

This protocol clarifies and supplements the duties of Officers and members of the Board of Directors as described in the Bylaws:

Board of Directors - Duties

"Duties" are tasks or responsibilities that members of the Board are required to complete or perform.

- Review and be aware of Association's Governing Documents (See Bylaws, Strategic Plan, Board Policies and Action Plan)
- Review, be aware of and support Management Staff responsibilities (See Contract and Scope of Work)
- Prepare for and attend all Board meetings throughout the year (Review Board Packet prior to meetings)
- Respect the confidentiality of the Board, the Association and its members
- Disclose conflicts of interest and avoid personal agendas
- Provide assistance and support to committee chairs, and the Executive Committee and Board, regardless of committee assignment

Board of Directors – Expectations

"Expectations" are tasks or responsibilities that members of the Board should attempt to fulfill.

- Promote all education events (Seminar, Webinars and Conference) to your contacts
- Promote sponsorships at Seminar and Annual Conference by contacting potential sponsors, exhibitors and vendors
- Promote membership by reaching out to at least one potential new member each quarter
- Keep abreast of legal issues affecting the stormwater industry
- Participate in all Communications/Networking conference calls
- Assist the Association's goals for advocacy fundraising by completing your assignments in a timely manner
- Submit one post and two replies to the Community Forum each quarter

2. Responding to Requests for Assistance on State-Specific Policy Issues

Purpose

This protocol establishes the procedures for the requests for assistance or support from SESWA on legislative, regulatory or other policy matters.

Process

Requests for assistance or support from SESWA on legislative, regulatory or other policy matters that are specific to an individual state shall be directed to the Management Company, who shall then forward the request to the Executive Committee and Chair of the Stormwater Policy Committee. Responses to such requests shall be based on the following process and information:

Minimal Criteria Necessary for Consideration by Executive Committee

- Is the request made by a SESWA member or members?
- Does the legislation or regulation have significant impact on local stormwater programs?
- If passed or adopted, would the proposed legislation or regulation constitute a significant precedent for other states to consider and therefore possibly impact other members?

Additional Factors for Consideration by the Executive Committee

- What is the estimated time and cost of SESWA's involvement?
- What is the nature of the request: Communicating to the sponsor of the initiative by email, letter or telephone? Attending meetings out of state? Organizing SESWA members to respond to the initiative?
- Does the request anticipate SESWA fully funding the initiative; if so, are funds available to cover the costs? Does the request anticipate that funding will be obtained by SESWA members from the affected state or other states; if so, who will coordinate that effort? Are SESWA members from the state in question willing to help fund or raise funds for the effort?
- Has Management and the Chair of the Stormwater Policy Committee recommended that the Executive Committee take Action?
- Is there a stormwater association in the state, and are they willing and able to participate in the issue?

Executive Committee

After considering the recommendations of the Management Company and the Chair of the Stormwater Policy Committee, the Executive Committee shall determine how to respond to the request, including the manner in which the activity is to be funded or funds are to be raised.

3. Financial Practices

Purpose

This protocol establishes the operating policies and procedures relating to the financial practices of the Association.

1. Travel

- a. All travel expenses must be within budget as approved by the Association's Board of Directors and must be approved in advance by the Association President.
- b. When travel expenses are to be charged against a state or federal grant, the travel policies required by the granting agency shall be followed in addition to the Association's policies.
- c. When travel occurs during the normal (non-grant) course of SESWA business, reimbursement shall be made for actual costs incurred; however, the use of personal vehicles for out of town travel shall be reimbursed at the current State of Florida reimbursement rate.
- d. Persons traveling on Association business shall use prudence and good judgment so as to obtain reasonable rates for lodging and other travel-related costs.

2. Check Signing

- a. The President, Secretary-Treasurer and the Executive Director have the authority to sign checks on the Association's behalf.
- b. Checks payable to the management company for regular retainers as approved by the Board of Directors in the annual budget or as amended thereto may be issued by means of electronic funds transfer without obtaining written approval of the Secretary-Treasurer; however, any other check payable to the management company or to any employee of the management company, regardless of the amount, must be approved by the Secretary-Treasurer prior to being issued.
- c. The signatures of both the Executive Director and the Secretary-Treasurer are required on any check to be issued for more than \$3,000.

3. Financial Reporting

- a. The Executive Director shall provide quarterly financial reports to the Board of Directors.
- b. The Executive Director shall provide copies of the Association's Bank Statement and Reconciliation Reports from the Association's accounting software to the Executive Committee on a monthly basis.

4. Insurance

a. The Association shall obtain General Liability insurance including dishonesty coverage that protects the Board of Directors, the Executive Director and employees of the management company.

5. Cash Reserves

a. The Association shall maintain cash reserves equal to the amount of expenditures necessary for three months operation of the association (excluding expenditures for conferences and education) based on the approved budget. In the event of an extenuating circumstance and when requested by the Executive Director, the Board of Directors or the Executive Committee may approve expenditures resulting in cash reserves being less than three months operating costs.

4. Code of Conduct

Purpose

Members of the Board of Directors and Management Staff have duties and responsibilities for the well-being of the organization. This protocol establishes standards of conduct and attention for members of the Board of Directors in carrying out his or her responsibilities to the association. These standards are described as the duty of obedience, the duty of loyalty and the duty of care.

- 1. The *duty* of *obedience* provides that the governing board of the organization must comply with state and federal law, and conform to the organization's charter, articles of incorporation, and bylaws.
- 2. The *duty* of *loyalty* provides that Officers and Directors must act in good faith and must not allow their personal interests prevail over the interests of the Southeast Stormwater Association.
- 3. The *duty* of *care* requires Directors and Officers to be diligent and prudent in managing the organization's affairs.

The Code of Conduct outlines some of those duties and responsibilities in accordance with governing documents.

1. Confidentiality

Board Members and Management Staff may have access to information that may be confidential and is intended for use in decision-making and governance only. Such information shall be held in confidence and shall not be divulged to an outside party without the authorization of the Board of Directors or the Executive Director.

2. Conflicts of Interest

No Board or Management Staff member shall maintain any activity that directly conflicts with the interests of the organization. Officers, Directors and Management Staff are required to disclose any activity or interest that could result in a conflict of interest.

3. Whistleblowers

SESWA's Code of Ethics and Conduct requires Directors, Officers and Management Staff to observe high standards of business and personal ethics in the conduct of their duties and responsibilities. Compliance with all applicable laws and regulations is stressed.

No Director, Officer or Management Staff member who in good faith reports a violation of the Code shall suffer harassment, retaliation or adverse employment consequence. A Management Staff member who retaliates against someone who has reported a violation in good faith is subject to discipline up to and including termination of employment. This Whistleblower Policy is intended to encourage and enable Management Staff and others to raise serious concerns within the organization prior to seeking resolution outside the organization.

4. Reporting Responsibility

A Management Staff member or general member may report a violation to any SESWA Officer or the Executive Director. Officers and the executive Director have a responsibility to investigate all reported violations.

It is the responsibility of all Directors, Officers and Management Staff to comply with the Code and to report violations or suspected violations in accordance with this Whistleblower Policy.

5. Violations

Violations of the Code of Conduct may result in disciplinary action, including the removal of a Board Member from office or termination of a Management Staff member.

5. Document Retention and Destruction

Purpose

This protocol applies to the records retention and destruction policy for the association's Management Staff and members of the Board of Directors as provided below. However, in no case shall documents be destroyed if doing so would be in violation of Florida Statutes.

Terms of Retention

- 1. Permanently
 - a. Governance records Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws and all amendments thereto.
- 2. Retain for ten years
 - a. *Minutes* Meeting minutes of the Board of Directors.
 - b. *Tax records* State and federal tax returns/reports and supporting records; tax exemption determination letter and related correspondence; and, files related to tax audits.
 - c. Financial records Financial statements and budgets.

3. Retain for three years

- a. *Lease, insurance, and contract/license records* Software license agreements, vendor, hotel, and service agreements, independent contractor agreements, employment and consultant agreements.
- b. *Other documents* Electronic correspondence, bank statements, publications, employee manuals/policies and procedures.

6. Process for Determining Compensation

Process

The management company contract (which includes the scope of work) is reviewed annually at the April budget meeting of the Board of Directors. In addition to reviewing/approving the contract and compensation, there are three additional components of review including:

- 1. Out of Scope Work Performed
- 2. Cost of Living Increase
- 3. Incentive/Bonus Pay

Out of Scope Work Performed

- In the April and October Board packets, the management company will provide a list of out of scope services and the associated cost for work performed during the year. The list will include new tasks not currently in the scope of work that were requested by the Board throughout the year and additional work performed on the tasks already in the scope of work that exceeded the amount allowed.
- The Board of Directors will authorize the Executive Committee to update the compensation and/or contract once the budget is finalized for the fiscal year
- The Executive Committee will review the out of scope work along with the fiscal year's proposed budget to determine if additional compensation will be provided to the management company, pursuant to Board policy.

Note: If the same service appears in the out of scope work two years in a row the Board of Directors will consider updating the contract to reflect this as a recurring task.

Cost of Living Increase

• The management company is responsible for requesting a cost of living increase based on their annual expenses. This request must occur during the April budget meeting for the Board of Directors review/approval.

Incentive/Bonus Pay

• Once the budget is finalized each fiscal year, the Executive Committee is authorized to offer a percentage of net income over budgeted profit to the management company for work that was performed above and beyond.

7. Association Committees [NEW]

<u>Purpose</u>

This protocol establishes the operating policies, practices and procedures for the Association's Committees and Committee Chairpersons.

- 1. Committees shall meet in conjunction with the Board of Directors' meetings as necessary. Agendas for Committee meetings shall be prepared by management staff in consultation with the Committee Chair. Notice of Committee meetings shall be distributed by management staff.
- 2. Committee Chairs shall report Committee actions to the Board of Directors or the Executive Committee after each meeting of the Committee.
- 3. All Committee actions shall be presented in a common format, which includes the following:
 - a. A summary of the action taken or the recommendation adopted;
 - b. Identification of person(s) responsible for implementing or otherwise following-up on the action; and
 - c. A timeline for completing or reporting on progress in completing the action or recommendation.
- 4. Confirmation of an action or recommendation of a Committee is required by the Board of Directors or the Executive Committee when:
 - a. The Committee's action or recommendation has a financial impact on the Association;
 - b. The Committee's action or recommendation affects SESWA policy;
 - c. The Committee's action or recommendation is to be communicated to the SESWA membership or the general public; or
 - d. The Committee's action or recommendation concerns a subject that is not within the normal or general purview of the Committee.
- 5. The Executive Committee, in consultation with management staff, shall have the responsibility for prioritizing recommendations received from the various Association Committees.


BACKGROUND ON THE 2021 STRATEGIC PLAN

SESWA Board of Directors, key leaders and management staff have taken time to review and update the Strategic Plan in 2021. To assist in this process an independent, professional facilitator was hired to gather and organize everyone's thoughts and ideas.

Four key focus areas were identified and goals, strategies and tactics were created.

- Focus Areas are high-priority items to focus effort on in working toward a vision.
- **Goals** are an organization's measurable objectives that are indicative of its long-term vision.
- Strategies are the means or techniques by which Goals may be attained.
- **Tactics** are the ways in which a Goal or Strategy would be accomplished. Tactics may be either measurable or observable, or both.

The SESWA Executive Committee will identify which goals and strategies to focus on each year to further SESWA's mission. These annual goals will create an Action Plan that will be provided to the Board of Directors and Committees to implement.

Southeast Stormwater Association Board of Directors' Meeting Minutes - Draft October 1, 2021

Online Meeting Via Zoom Meetings

SESWA President Scott Hofer called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. In attendance were Scott Hofer (Jefferson County DOH, AL); Cory Rayburn (Jacobs); W. Dave Canaan (Mecklenburg County, NC); Synithia Williams (Richland County, SC); Patrick Blandford (HDR); John Butler (Gwinnett County, GA); Barrett Fisher (Hamilton County, TN); Rosemary Ginn (City of Mobile, AL); Laurie Hawks (Hawks Environmental, GA); Katie Beth Jennings (Columbia County, GA); Demetria Kimball-Mehlhorn (Lexington Fayette Urban County, KY); Kevin Kubiak (Berkeley County, SC); Milton Leggett (City of Stuart, FL); Steve Leo (Ardurra); David Mason (CDM Smith); Angela Moss (City of Birmingham); Kristen O'Reilly (City of Charlotte, NC); Steven Peene (ATM – A Geosyntec Company); Hillary Repik (Town of Mt. Pleasant, SC); Clint Wayman (City of Chattanooga, TN); and Danielle Hopkins, Rhea Oaks, Lynn Buchanan and Diane Morrill-Murphy (management staff).

1. Welcome and Introductions

Scott Hofer welcomed the Board of Directors and thanked everyone for attending the meeting. Each member introduced themselves and answered an icebreaker question.

2. Review Board of Directors Documents

Scott Hofer reviewed the Board of Directors Guidelines and Expectations document which outlines the duties and expectations of the Board of Directors. Mr. Hofer presented the 2021 Action Plan. He reviewed each goal and identified the Committee responsible and thanked the Committee Chairs.

A copy of the final 2021 Strategic Plan was included in the Board of Directors meeting Packet. Danielle Hopkins reviewed the 2021 Strategic Plan format, purpose, process used to produce the

document and identified the next steps for the Board of Directors. Ms. Hopkins thanked the Board of Directors for their participation and contribution to the 2021 Strategic Plan. She announced that Scott Hofer will introduce the 2021 Strategic Plan at the Annual Conference to the membership and a one-page summary of the 2021 Strategic Plan will be posted on the SESWA website.

3. Approve April 2021 Meeting Minutes

A motion was made to approve the minutes of the April 22, 2021 Board of Directors Meeting. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

4. Review Actions from Last Meeting

Scott Hofer reported the status of the action items from the April 2021 Board of Directors meeting and actions taken by the Executive Committee since the April 2021 meeting.

Action Items from April 2021 Meeting

- Management staff implemented the Harassment Policy and Privacy Policy as approved by the Board of Directors
- Leadership met online April 14 and 15, 2021 for the Strategic Planning exercise. The final Plan was approved by the Board of Directors in September.

Executive Committee Actions since April 2021

- The Executive Committee met on July 9, 2021 for their regularly scheduled quarterly association review.
- Due to COVID-19 the Executive Committee unanimously approved management staff's recommendation to change the platform of the 2021 Annual Conference, all October meetings and the Annual Membership Meeting to an online format.

5. Approve Finance Report

A Finance Report for the 2020-21 fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020 and ending June 30, 2021 was included in the Board of Directors meeting packet. The End of Year Report compares the adopted budget with actual income and expense. Danielle Hopkins reported the adopted budget

for FY 2020-21 projected a net loss of \$16,775, however the year ended with a net income of \$42,716, a difference of \$59,491 more than budget. Ms. Hopkins noted the difference was primarily due to increased membership income and profit from the 2020 Annual Conference and 2021 Spring Seminar. She noted the following observations:

- Membership dues income was \$107,225, which is \$15,256 more than budget.
- The 2021 Southeast Stormwater Utility Report budget anticipated breaking even with both income and expense totaling \$5,000. Actual income totaled \$2,500 with expenses of \$2,321.
- The 2020 Annual Conference was planned to be held in-person in Hilton Head Island, SC, but was transitioned to an online event. Net income for the Online 2020 Annual Conference was \$70,722, or \$33,072 more than budget. The increase in profit was primarily due to increased attendance and sponsor participation as well as keeping expenses low. A final Finance Report for the 2020 Annual Conference was included in the Board of Directors meeting packet.
- The 2021 Spring Seminar was also planned to be held in-person in Atlanta, GA but was transitioned to an online event. Net income for the online 2021 Spring Seminar was \$22,284, or \$11,784 more than budget. The increase in profit was primarily due to the reduction in expenses of hosting an online event. A 2021 Seminar Finance Report was included in the Board of Directors meeting packet.
- The 2021 State Spotlight webinar was focused on content and participants in Florida and provided a net income of \$295.
- Due to the transition of the April Board of Directors' meetings to an online format, the Board of Directors expense was reduced by approximately \$4,000.
- An additional \$6,725 was allocated by the Board of Directors for time spent by AMP for work performed out of scope for transitioning and hosting the 2020 Annual Conference online.
- The Strategic Planning exercise was postponed to April 2021 due to the pandemic and all expenses have been finalized.

• At the end of fiscal year 2020-21 the Litigation Fund had a balance of \$92.

Reserves and Assets

As of June 30, 2021, SESWA had a balance of \$340,360 in its checking account, plus \$623 in prepaid expenses. SESWA had total retained earnings (reserves) of \$202,586.

Ms. Hopkins noted that SESWA financial policies require the maintenance of cash reserves equal to the amount of expenditures necessary for the operation of the Association for three months based on the current budget. For fiscal year 2020-21, three months of general operating costs equals \$37,149 which is well within the Association's unrestricted reserves of \$202,494.

A motion was made to approve the FY 2020-21 End of the Year Finance Report as presented. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

FY 2021-22 Updates

Danielle Hopkins reported as of September 20, 2021 SESWA had 177 member organizations and have met budget.

A current Finance Report for the 2021 Annual Conference was emailed to the Board of Directors prior to the meeting. Rhea Oaks provided an update. She reported due to high attendee and sponsor participation the projected income was approximately \$75,000 and projected expenses were approximately \$3,000 due to the lower cost of hosting an online event.

PCI Compliance Report

Danielle Hopkins reported that SESWA's credit card security measures are compliant with the Payment Card Industry (PCI) Data Security Standards.

Compensation Policy

Danielle Hopkins reported that AMP is currently tracking out of scope time for the 2021 Annual Conference and will present final numbers at the April 2022 Board of Directors meeting per the protocol for management company compensation.

ACTION ITEM - Management staff will provide final counts for the time that was spent outside of the contracted Scope of Work for the 2021 Annual Conference.

8. Committee Reports

Communications

Kevin Kubiak, Communications Committee Chair, gave the report. Mr. Kubiak reported the Committee reviewed the distribution data of the Community Forum and the *ForeCast eNewsletter* promotions. The Committee noted an increase of participation in the Community Forum. The Committee discussed ideas to generate more articles for the *ForeCast eNewsletter* and more conversation during the networking call. The Committee agreed to submit topics, themes, and/or questions to pose to the group before each networking call. A 2021-22 Networking Call Schedule was included in the Board of Directors meeting packet.

Conference and Education

Demetria Kimball-Mehlhorn, Conference and Education Committee Chair, gave the report. Ms. Kimball-Mehlhorn reported that the Committee discussed potential topics for the SESWA Webinar and the possibility of expanding the format to include field staff. The Committee discussed potential themes for the 2022 Spring Seminar Call for Presentations. She encouraged the Board of Directors to submit ideas to SESWA. The Committee reviewed the 2021 Annual Conference and discussed online challenges. Ms. Kimballl-Mehlhorn requested those attending the Conference to stay active throughout the day. The Committee discussed the 2022 Annual Conference. All agreed they were hoping for a Hilton Head Island in-person event.

Membership

Angela Moss, Membership Committee Chair, gave the report. Ms. Moss reported the Committee reviewed membership numbers, stating at the time of the meeting there were 177 members including 8 new members. The Committee discussed membership recruitment efforts including the creation of a prospect list, mailing of letters to prospects and follow up calls. The Committee agreed to continue to follow up with those who make inquiries and prospects that attend SESWA events. The Committee reviewed and updated the Welcome Program assignments and agreed to continue to contact new members to welcome them to the Association.

Stormwater Policy

Katie Beth Jennings, Stormwater Policy Committee Chair, gave the report of the Committee's actions. Ms. Jennings reported the Committee discussed WOTUS updates. The Committee also reviewed and updated the Southeast MS4 Permit Database tool.

The following updates were provided on the task assignments from the previous Committee meeting:

- SWU Factsheet Ad-Hoc Committee: The Committee including Damien Di Vittorio, Steve Leo, Dave Mason, and Steven Peene completed work on a one-page SWU Factsheet *Why Should My Community Consider a Stormwater Utility?* which highlights the benefits of a Stormwater Utility Program. The Factsheet is available on the SESWA website.
- Stormwater Infrastructure Funding Ad-Hoc Committee: The Committee including Laurie Hawks, Damien Di Vittorio, Steve Leo, and Cory Rayburn was formed to develop an advocacy initiative to promote stormwater funding for infrastructure programs. The Committee drafted a white paper on Stormwater Infrastructure Funding and sent letters to Congress with recommendations. The whitepaper is available on the Advocacy page of the website.

7. Litigation Report

Waters of the United States

Danielle Hopkins reviewed the Summary of WOTUS Policy Status document provided in the Board of Directors meeting packet in the Stormwater Policy section and reminded the Board of Directors that SESWA, FSA and others challenged the 2015 rule due to its extremely broad scope and fiscal impact on local governments. Ms. Hopkins summarized the new developments. She reported that the recent decision in a federal District Court in Arizona remanded and vacated the 2020 Navigable Waters Protection Rule, which narrowed the definitions of waters of the United States. Vacating the 2020 Navigable Waters Protection Rule reverts WOTUS policy back to the pre-2015 regulations that were originally developed in the 1980s. She noted that if the 2019 repeal rule is vacated and invalidated, current policy would revert back to the 2015 Clean Water Rule. At the time of this reporting the challenge to the 2015 rule had been voluntarily withdrawn and held in abeyance with the understanding it could be reactivated in the future if necessary. SESWA is

actively monitoring the ongoing litigation and management staff will keep SESWA leadership informed.

8. Nominating Committee Report

Committee Chair Laurie Hawks (Hawks Environmental) thanked current officers for their past two years of service. Ms. Hawks reported the Nominating Committee including Hillary Repik (Town of Mt. Pleasant, SC), and Daryl Hammock (City of Charlotte, NC) met and approved the following recommendations to the general membership for SESWA Officers:

• President Cory Rayburn (GA – Private)

• Vice President W. Dave Canaan (NC – Local Government)

• Secretary-Treasurer Synithia Williams (SC – Local Government)

9. Next Board Meeting

Danielle Hopkins reported the next scheduled meeting of the Board of Directors would be in conjunction with the 2022 Spring Seminar on April 21, 2022 in Atlanta, GA.

- 2. The Stormwater Policy Committee added a meeting to their schedule on January 26, 2022. The Committee met to discuss upcoming initiatives and the revised WOTUS Rules.
- 3. Secretary-Treasurer, Synithia Williams (Richland County, SC), resigned as Secretary-Treasurer effective February 3, 2022. Ms. Williams accepted a new position with an organization that is not affiliated with SESWA as it does not currently have a stormwater program. Following the protocol to fill the Secretary-Treasurer vacancy, the 2021-22 Nominating Committee made a recommendation to appoint Kevin Kubiak (Berkeley County, SC). This recommendation was provided to the Board of Directors electronically and was unanimously approved. Kevin Kubiak assumed the Secretary-Treasurer responsibilities on February 4, 2022. Mr. Kubiak also agreed to complete his term as the Communications Committee Chair.

6. Approve Finance Report*

Finance Report - Quarter III, FY 2021-22

SESWA's fiscal year began July 1, 2021. A Finance Report generated by our accounting software for the first nine months (ending March 31, 2022) of FY 2021-22 is enclosed. The Report compares the adopted budget with actual income and expense. Note that income and expense are grouped by category (General, Publications, Education, Legal) to allow for easy comparisons of net income.

Significant observations as of this reporting period are:

- [General] Dues Membership dues income exceeded budget by \$10,255. As of March 31, 2022, there were 189 organizational members (over 1,360 individuals), including 18 new member organizations. For reference, there were 183 organizational members at this time last year. A membership history report charting the last ten years is enclosed for your information. More detailed information may be found in the Membership Committee's section of this meeting packet.
- [General] Communications Sponsors There was an increased number of Communications Sponsors exceeding budget by \$3,000.
- [General] Board of Directors Final expenses for the April Board of Directors meeting will be finalized at the end of April. We anticipate this line item meeting the budget goal.
- [Education] Annual Conference Net income from the 2021 Annual Conference was \$85,525, or \$74,815 more than budget. The Conference budget anticipated an in-person event, however, due to the pandemic a decision was made to host the Conference online. The online Conference generated higher than anticipated attendee and sponsor participation. In addition, expenses were minimized by hosting both educational tracks in the Zoom platform. A separate finance report for the Annual Conference is enclosed. Note that the Conference finance report does not include time that management staff spent out of the Scope of Work related to producing the online event. Out of Scope time is addressed later in this report.
- [Education] Spring Seminar The 2022 Seminar income and expense will not be finalized until the end of April. To date, the Seminar is anticipated to meet budget. To provide the most

current information available, a finance report for the 2022 Seminar will be provided at the Board of Directors meeting.

• [Education] Spotlight Webinar – The May 2022 "State Spotlight" webinar will be SESWA's fifth webinar in this format. By way of background, the Spotlight webinar came from a Membership Committee recommendation several years ago with a goal of featuring a state within the region. One obvious benefit of adding this service was to allow non-members to participate and see what SESWA has to offer. When this additional webinar was proposed, it was outside of AMP's contracted services. AMP was asked to invoice the Association separately. To offset the cost, SESWA would charge a registration fee for the Spotlight webinar.

Prior to launching this year's Spotlight webinar, the Executive Committee approved management staff's recommendation to provide this event at no cost. As a reminder, SESWA offers two free member-only webinars and one State Spotlight webinar open to members and non-members. The free webinars have high participation rates, and the hope is that the same will be true for the Spotlight. SESWA will now incur the cost of the Spotlight webinar without charging a registration fee.

• [Legal & Advocacy] On October 1, 2021, the Executive Committee approved \$3,600 for assistance developing a letter to Congress and the development of SESWA's Stormwater Funding White Paper. As of March 31, 2022, SESWA's Legal Fund finance balance is \$92.06.

Reserves and Assets

A Balance Sheet through March 31, 2022, and a Retained Earnings report from 2005 through 2021 are enclosed. As of March 31, 2022, SESWA had a checking account balance of \$337,647, plus \$15,000 in prepaid expenses. Retained earnings equal \$245,302.

SESWA financial policies require the maintenance of cash reserves equal to the amount of expenditures necessary for the operation of the Association for three months (general expenses only – Publications, Education and Legal are not included) based on the current budget. For FY 2021-22, three months of general operating costs equal \$38,499; the Association's unrestricted reserves are \$245,210.





7. Approve Proposed FY 2022-23 Budget*

Proposed Budget for FY 2022-23 (July 1 – June 30)

A Proposed Budget for FY 2022-23 is enclosed. For comparison purposes, the budget includes four columns of information. The first three columns provide details for FY 2021-22 (column 1 = actual income and expense through the 3^{rd} Quarter; column 2 = the annual budget; and column 3 = projections through the end of the year. The final column is a proposed budget for FY 2022-23. Observations of note are:

FY 2021-22 End of Year Projections (3rd Column)

We anticipate ending FY 2021-22 with a net profit of \$54,551, or \$83,246 more than budget. Of note the request for AMP's time spent out of the Scope of Work (Section 6 of this packet) is included in the projection.

The primary reasons for the increase in net profit include:

- Membership (+10,255) The budget anticipated a reduction in membership renewals; however, a focused effort to recruit members resulted in high retention rates.
- 2021 Annual Conference (+74,815) The transition to an online event allowed for increased participation. More participants along with lower costs, contributed to higher net profit.

2022-23 Proposed Budget (4th Column)

The proposed budget is based on the following assumptions:

[General]

- Membership dues income will maintain at the current rate. Of note, updated census
 information will be incorporated into this year's member rates. A concerted membership
 retention effort by the Board of Directors and Membership Committee will help secure
 budgeted goals.
- The retainer paid to AMP includes all association management services and related expenses (staff time and related staffing costs, all services identified in the Scope of Work, office space, utilities, equipment, etc.) provided by AMP for SESWA per the Scope of

Work. AMP is asking for a 2% cost of living adjustment, having not done so for the last two years.

In addition, the cost to produce SESWA's webinars (two member webinars + a State Spotlight webinar) are moved from the "Webinar Spotlight Expense" and "Webinar Expense" line items to AMP's retainer. Currently AMP invoices SESWA to produce all webinars, moving this recurring expense to the AMP retainer will simplify the bookkeeping process. Regarding the State Spotlight webinar, it is our recommendation that these webinars no longer charge a registration fee to cover SESWA's cost.

• The amount provided under "AMP-Other" is an estimate of time set aside for the implementation of Strategic Plan initiatives beyond the current contracted Scope of Work.

[Publications]

• SESWA's Survey of Stormwater Utilities Report will be produced in 2023. The proposed budget estimates that income and expense will breakeven.

[Education]

• SESWA's 2022 Annual Conference and 2023 Seminar are proposed as in-person events with a slight reduction in capacity anticipating possible social distancing requirements and travel safety concerns. It is important to note that SESWA is currently under contract with host facilities through 2023. These contracts obligate the Association to sleeping room and food/beverage commitments. A concerted effort to ensure participation for SESWA's future events is critical. Historically, SESWA Education contributes to more than half (57%-68%) of the association's income overall.

[Legal/Regulatory]

Based on this year's activity, the proposed budget sets aside funds for regulatory
management services if needed. No other income or expense is budgeted for legal fees or
costs. Any legal expenditure must be approved in advance by the Executive Committee.
These expenses would be paid either out of general reserves or through a new fundraising
effort or some combination of both.

B. Special Meetings

ARTICLE VI COMMITTEES AND ASSOCIATION POLICY

- Conference and Education The conference and education committee shall be responsible

 conferences, and all educational programs of the Association.
- 2. Membership The membership committee shall be responsible for the oversight of new member recruitment programs, providing membership services and ensuring continuity of the existing membership.
- 3. Communications The communications committee shall be responsible for the oversight of the newsletter and of the Association's website.
- 4. Stormwater Policy The stormwater policy committee shall be responsible for the oversight of the Association's activities relating to Congress and federal agencies as they concern the objectives of the Association.

Southeast Stormwater Association 2022 Action Plan

The Action Plan identifies goals and strategies for the 2022 year. Its Goals are drawn from the Strategic Plan. The Strategies to attain the Goals are identified herein along with suggested Tactics. The Action Plan is supplemental in nature to the Board of Directors' Duties and Expectations.

President's Corner

Happy New Year to the SESWA membership and fingers crossed for a safe and prosperous 2022. This past year, members of SESWA's leadership took part in a virtual planning session to develop a Strategic Plan for the next five years. Much of the plan centers around ensuring that SESWA provides continued value to our membership while growing and adapting to our changing times.



Over the past two years, SESWA management staff have mastered the virtual format when it comes to delivering insightful and compelling content related to our industry, whether it be through webinars or full-blown conferences. The feedback we've received only confirms that as an association, we've been able to quickly adapt and maintain a relevant presence in the industry. We're looking closely at integrating this value-added experience into our networking and educational opportunities for all members, including the next generation of stormwater professionals.

We've also witnessed or been impacted by continued rainfall patterns that appear to be the new normal. On average, the metro-Atlanta area receives 50" of rainfall a year. In the past 12 years, we've seen close to 70" of rainfall five different times with drought conditions scattered in between. Regulatory News

WOTUS Litigation and Rulemaking

Since courts in New Mexico and Arizona vacated (invalidated) the 2020 Navigable Waters Protection (WOTUS) Rule, the Biden Administration has interpreted those decisions as having a nationwide effect and EPA and the Army Corps of Engineers are no longer implementing policy based on the 2020 rule but are reverting to policy as existed in the late 1980s. On December 7, 2021, the Agencies proposed a new set of WOTUS definitions. Comments on the proposed rule must be submitted on or before February 7, 2022 to Regulations.gov. SESWA will be submitting comments on behalf of our members, visit the Advocacy page to learn more about WOTUS. Meanwhile, the U.S. Supreme Court has agreed to hear an appeal of a decision of the Ninth Circuit concerning whether the correct test was used to determine whether wetlands are subject to federal jurisdiction under the CWA. The issue of whether jurisdiction over wetlands is broadly or narrowly interpreted was one of the primary reasons for the initiatives to revise WOTUS definitions since 2014.

Construction General Permit Finalized

EPA has finalized the latest version of its general permit for stormwater discharges at construction sites or "CGP." The final permit maintains a requirement for turbidity benchmark monitoring of certain discharges and becomes effective on February 17, 2022. The CGP only applies in the three states in which the EPA is the NPDES permitting authority – none are in Region 4, although it does apply to Indian Country lands within some southeastern states. However, many states with delegated permitting

programs use the EPA permit as a guide. EPA is hosting a <u>webinar on February 24, 2022</u> to review the final permit and answer questions.

Around the Southeast

Sustainability and Stormwater

John Butler, Gwinnett County, GA

As stormwater professionals, much of what we do naturally revolves around sustainability. Protecting stream banks, improving water quality, building aquatic habitat, and infiltrating runoff all help to sustain a high quality of life for our communities and our environment. In Gwinnett County, GA, a new Sustainability Team has been formed to help move the County forward to a more sustainable future. To help measure progress with sustainable initiatives, the Atlanta Regional Commission administers a <u>Green Communities Certification</u> for local governments. The <u>certification manual</u> for this program covers everything from green buildings to transportation. Many items in the program overlap with stormwater principles, but two in particular stand out. Points are awarded for green infrastructure installed at government owned facilities and for education programs that address protection of watersheds. Gwinnett County is currently certified at the Platinum level, the highest level that can be achieved, and is due for recertification in 2022. Green Infrastructure and stormwater education will be a big part of recertifying this year.

Leveraging Disaster Recovery Grant Funds for Stormwater Infrastructure Projects Synithia Williams, Richland County, SC

After the unprecedented flooding in October 2015 followed by Hurricane Irma in 2016, Richland County's Stormwater Management Division leveraged Hazard Mitigation Grant Program and Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery funds toward several infrastructure projects. The Division's 25 Year Stormwater Strategic Plan identified high priority projects, which the County submitted for grant funding. Having a strategic plan that identified infrastructure needs resulted in a quick submittal of projects for consideration. Many of the disaster recovery grants require projects that are shovel ready. Because these projects identified were part of the County's Capital Improvement Program, project studies and designs were complete and funding for construction was the next step. Having a cost-benefit analysis as part of every project design can also make an infrastructure project more desirable. A cost-benefit analysis demonstrates the need for the project, and that the project is the best option to mitigate the needs in the area. By identifying infrastructure needs, proceeding with the design of the most crucial projects and proving the selected project is the best option; your organization can be in a better position to leverage disaster recovery grant funds for infrastructure projects.

Chattanooga Installs Automated High Water Warning System

Marie Price, City of Chattanooga, TN

The greatest cause of weather-related deaths in the U.S. is flash flooding; about half of those drownings are vehicle related. In many cases Public Works staff and emergency responders can be found manually placing road closure barricades and signage at inundated crossings, often after business hours and after the roadway is flooded. Through Safeware, the City of Chattanooga, TN used U.S. Communities Contract #4400008468 to procure a High Sierra automated high water warning system with flashers and gates, along with access to Contrail OneRain. The system provides real-time data collection, analysis and management, and advanced alarm and notification. Automation provides benefits such as protection of motorized citizens and first responders. This system gives the City of Chattanooga the ability to gather water level data during events, which aids in mitigation planning, attaining grants, updating impact statements, better flood forecasting and better utilization of city resources. The first installation went live in early 2021. The next installation is forthcoming and involves moving the base station to a more central location as the first installation was proof of concept. Chattanooga plans to install several more at flood prone streets around the city. For more information, contact Maria Price, PE, Engineering Manager, Public Works Department, City of Chattanooga.

Assessing Needs for Stormwater Systems

The deadline for compliance with the first cycle of reporting under the provisions of Florida House Bill 53 (2021 Session) is fast approaching. The legislation requires local governments with wastewater or

stormwater management systems to create a 20-year needs analysis, including a description of the system, the number of future residents served, revenues and expenditures, maintenance costs, etc. The compiled information will be filed with the Legislature's Office of Economic and Demographic Research. The first analysis is due on June 20, 2022 and every five years thereafter. EDR has now released the survey instrument that will be used to gather financial information.

Region 4 Urban Best Management Practices Literature Review

In support of the Tennessee Nutrient Task Force BMP working group, EPA HQ and Region 4 provided contract work to compile a <u>comprehensive inventory of scientific literature</u> for urban stormwater BMPs from the Southeast Region of the United States. This literature review includes summaries of loading and removal efficiencies for nutrients, sediment, and other common pollutants, and a summary of the crediting practices and protocols used in the study area. The time span covered in this literature review follows the EPA work on Urban BMPs published in the early 2000s.

Florida's 2022 Legislative Session Underway

Florida's 60-day Legislative Session began on January 11th. Continuing a trend that began a few years ago, local governments' authority to initiate programs and policy independently remain under attack in a variety of ways:

- Assessment of Costs against Local Governments (SB 280) Expands the types of conditions under which civil actions may be filed and awarded against local governments.
- Business Damages (SB 620) Creates a new basis for lawsuits against a city or county by businesses if an ordinance or charter provision causes a 15% drop in the business's profits.
- Agricultural Nutrient Application Rates (<u>SB 1000</u>) Authorizes the use of nutrient rate tailoring when recommended by certified professionals and exempts such agricultural properties from Basin Management Action Plans.
- Development of Agricultural Land (SB 1210) Provides that the application of pesticides as part of agricultural operations is presumed to be a lawful application under certain circumstances and is exempt from regulation by state environmental agency.

Upcoming Phase 2 Stakeholder Permit "Reading Sessions"

James Moore, Georgia Association of Water Professionals

Benjamin Franklin famously said, "By failing to prepare, you are preparing to fail." Georgia's Phase 2 MS4 Permit will be coming up for reissuance in 2022. In preparation of this, the Georgia Association of Water Professionals (GAWP) is preparing to host a stakeholder draft permit "reading session" once the stakeholder draft permit has been released. Representatives of all interested Phase 2 permittees will have the opportunity to gather at GAWP's facility in Marietta or join remotely.

A guided read-through of each section of the draft permit will be carried out, with attendees allowed to discuss each section with the group. The goal is to allow permittees the opportunity to thoroughly understand the contents and potential impacts of the proposed permit while benefiting from the knowledge and experience of their peers. These discussions can then guide each permittees' efforts in preparing their comments to the Georgia Environmental Protection Division, if they so choose. Even those permittees choosing not to comment may benefit from being part of the discussion. The date of the reading session has not been determined and will be based on the release date of the stakeholder draft Phase 2 permit. Contact <u>James Moore</u> for additional information.

WOTUS Comment Deadline Nears, Unclear if Proposal Will Be the Last

In early December 2021, U.S. EPA and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) <u>published a proposed rulemaking</u> for a "Revised Definition of Waters of the United States." Rather than repealing and then replacing the previous administration's Navigable Waters Protection Rule, the Biden administration has instead directly proposed a revised WOTUS definition that, if finalized, would replace the current regulations.

Even so, EPA and USACE have signaled that this rulemaking may not be the last definition this Administration proposes. For instance, EPA and USACE state they "will also consider changes through a second rulemaking which they anticipate proposing in the future, which would build upon the foundation of this proposed rule."

The proposed definition reflects the original 1986 WOTUS regulations, with modifications intended to address subsequent U.S. Supreme Court precedent in the cases of *Riverside Bayview, SWANCC, and Rapanos*.

Specifically, the proposed rule would include within the definition of WOTUS: traditional navigable waters, interstate waters and the territorial seas (and their adjacent wetlands), as well as other waters and tributaries (and their adjacent wetlands) that are relatively permanent or that either alone or in combination with similarly situated waters significantly affect the chemical, physical, or biological integrity of the foundational waters. The definition would also include most impoundments.

Notably, while the proposal would keep the longstanding exclusions for waste treatment systems and prior converted croplands codified in EPA and USACE's regulations, it would not retain the existing exclusions for stormwater control features, water recycling structures, and groundwater. Those exclusions were first codified in the 2015 Clean Water Rule and were retained in the 2020 Navigable Waters Protection Rule.

The proposed reasoning for omitting the additional exclusions is that they were not included in the "familiar and longstanding framework" in place prior to the 2015 rule, and therefore are not "consistent with the goal of returning" to that framework. However, the proposal does note that the Agencies "expect to implement the proposed rule consistent with longstanding agency practices," in which they have "generally not asserted jurisdiction" over features such as stormwater control features, water recycling structures, and groundwater.

NACWA has long advocated for key exclusions in the WOTUS definition that support the work done by the clean water community in advancing the purposes of the CWA. The clean water community was successful in securing the codification of such exclusions in previous WOTUS revisions and are working towards obtaining the same clear and defensible outcome for our organizations in the current definitional rewrite. Direct input from utilities and stormwater agencies potentially impacted by this proposed rewrite will be critical.

NACWA has requested an additional 30-days to gather comments and compile a meaningful and helpful comment letter that reflects the concerns with this approach as well as other concerns like the omission of certain jurisdictional exclusions. In NACWA's viewpoint, this is inadequate given the complexities inherent to defining a WOTUS and novel approaches the Agencies are pursuing including the relatively permanent standard or the significant nexus standard from U.S. Supreme Court precedent.

EPA Proposes Revised Draft of Financial Capability Assessment Guidance Emily Remmel, Director of Regulatory Affairs, NACWA



In February, the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) released its updated Financial Capability Assessment (FCA) Guidance in the Federal Register and is seeking a new round of public comments by April 25, 2022. In light of growing affordability challenges across water, wastewater, and stormwater, NACWA, along with the American Water Works Association (AWWA) and the Water Environment Federation (WEF) prepared summary comments in anticipation of EPA revisiting its dated 1995 and 1997 FCA guidance.

Over the past several decades, communities throughout the United States have experienced significant increases in the cost of providing water, sewer, and stormwater services. Factors contributing to this escalation include challenges associated with aging infrastructure, climate change, increasing regulatory mandates, population declines in urban centers, population growth and shifts to water-strapped areas, and declining demand resulting from conservation efforts, among others. As a result, increased utility costs have resulted in significant increase [74] in water and sewer rates and associated household bills. **Read More**



Recruitment Call Strategy

1. Introduce yourself and establish rapport.

Let them know you are following up on a letter they should have just received.

- ✓ Ask them if they have any questions.
- ✓ Find common ground (tell them briefly what you do/how it relates to their job. Share SESWA experiences mention the conference where you've met colleague, etc.)

2. Focus on the contact's immediate needs and aspirations – listen for their "hot button" or passion.

A "hot button" represents an issue needing immediate attention. Whatever the need is, the answer can be found through involvement in one of the association's many programs/services or by connecting with another member. See example below:

- Since you are over the storm water program at X, I wanted to reach out.
- I serve on the SESWA membership committee and am reaching out wearing that "hat".
- I understand how valuable your time is and don't want to take much of it.
- We can only join a limited # of organizations due to time and budgetary constraints
 SESWA is one that I have made a conscious choice to be a part of.

3. Extend an invitation to join; avoid a sales pitch.

Be enthusiastic and genuine when extending the invitation. See example below:

- I have heard about some jurisdictions in our area/state having issues with EXAMPLES: (the new Phase 2 permit, LID implementation, MS4 audits, etc.)
- I am passionate about stormwater and SESWA too as an organization that has given me tools to help my City/program.
- We have an annual survey that goes out about stormwater utilities, and we offer the conferences (see list of benefits in letter) ...these are so beneficial.
- I have also met great colleagues/storm water professionals who experience the same issues that we do. Rest assured there is someone else with the same issues as you.
- SESWA takes pride in being a cross section of the best of the stormwater community (literally) across the southeast.

4. Answer questions, neutralize objections, and reinforce the value of membership.

Expect some pessimism and hesitancy – they may have had bad experiences. See example:

- If you have any questions, I would be happy to answer. Listen and answer questions.
- *Oh, you want to become a member... you just blah, blah, blah.*
- If not, I don't want to take any more of your time you can call or email me later if you think of something.
- I don't want to take any more of your time, but I wanted to let you know about the offerings of SESWA.

5. If more time is needed to decide; summarize the conversation, extend the invitation again, and set a convenient time to reconnect.

Leave them with just the facts that pertain to them and the benefits of joining.

- ✓ Reinforce the idea that they've been specially selected to be invited because of who they are and how they can contribute to the profession.
- ✓ Reach out again as promised. Answer questions affirming that you'll help them make their important first connections.

Revised Definition of "Waters of the United States" Comments of the Southeast Stormwater Association

To Whom It May Concern:

On December 7, 2021, the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) published revised regulations concerning the definitions of waters subject to the jurisdiction of the federal government or "waters of the United States" ("WOTUS") as the term is used in the application of the Clean Water Act (CWA) and Corps jurisdictional regulations. This letter presents the comments and suggestions of the Southeast Stormwater Association, Incorporated (SESWA) concerning revisions to such regulations, especially as relates to the potential impacts on Part 122 of the Code of the Federal Regulations (CFR), EPA Administered Permit Programs – the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System or "NPDES" program.

The Southeast Stormwater Association

SESWA is a voluntary, non-partisan, non-profit corporation organized under subsection 501(c)(4) of the Internal Revenue Service Code. Its membership area is co-terminus with the boundaries of EPA Region 4. There are over 185 organizational members of SESWA, primarily consisting of municipal and county governments that must obtain and comply with Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) permits. SESWA's membership also includes various water control districts and authorities, academic institutions, product manufacturers, and many consulting and engineering firms. There are 1,300 individuals who are actively engaged as members of SESWA.

SESWA has been actively involved in the development of water quality policy and the implementation of water quality improvement programs for the past 19 years. All of the members of SESWA have an interest in surface water quality improvement and the effective implementation of the MS4 permit program.

Summary of Recommendations

SESWA recognizes the need for federal oversight that sets basic standards for the protection of waterbodies and water quality and that the proposed definitions for Waters of the United States (WOTUS) should contain provisions that ensure protection of waterbodies and water quality. We believe that the forthcoming rules should contain measures that ensure environmental protection while improving regulatory clarity and lessening burdens on MS4s. SESWA also recognizes the need of its members to have a clear understanding of the boundary between their stormwater systems and WOTUS. Based on this, the comments presented below reflect the Associations desire for greater clarity and specificity in the definitions so that the rules are applied consistently and allow for the management of stormwater treatment systems to help meet the goals of the Clean Water Act.

At this time, SESWA offers the following recommendations for clarifications to the proposed revisions of the WOTUS definitions and regulations:

- 1. Waste Treatment Systems As part of the exclusions which would fit under Waste Treatment Systems, SESWA recommends reestablishment of the exclusion (from the 2020 rule) for stormwater control features:
 - a. Non-jurisdictional waters. The following are not "waters of the United States": (10) Stormwater control features constructed or excavated in upland or in non-jurisdictional waters to convey, treat, infiltrate, or store stormwater runoff.
- 2. Adjacent Wetlands We recommend that the term "adjacent wetlands" be revised to include wetlands that are within a 100-year floodplain of a jurisdictional water, including wetlands that are separated by a man-made or natural barrier from a jurisdictional water or lack a direct hydrologic connection thereto, and that the definition thereof be revised as follows:
 - a. (3)(i) Adjacent wetlands. The term adjacent wetlands means wetlands that abut or have a direct hydrologic surface connection to a jurisdictional water in a typical year. Abut means to touch at least at one point or side or to be within the floodplain of a 100-year flood event of a jurisdictional water. A direct hydrologic surface connection occurs as a result of inundation from a jurisdictional water to a wetland or via perennial or intermittent flow between a wetland and a jurisdictional water.

General Comments

- 1. SESWA believes that the rules should contain provisions that improve regulatory clarity for MS4s and assist MS4s in the implementation of their permit conditions. This should include more specificity on the specific types of stormwater treatment and conveyance infrastructure that would not be deemed WOTUS.
- 2. SESWA agrees with the stated goal of this rule "to Provide Certainty for the Definition of WOTUS." Evaluation of the rule language and the supporting documentation does not seem to fully support the stated goal in that the removal of some of the clear methods for determining and quantifying jurisdictional waters that were in previous rules leaves uncertainty. Both the 2015 and 2020 WOTUS rules provide definitions of jurisdictional waters in such a way that a map could be made of the WOTUS with a fairly high level of certainty (although very different maps). This rule does not have those levels of certainty and leaves too much to the discretion of local regulators.
- 3. The rule specifically avoids certain levels of specificity in the definitions so as to allow the discretion of the regulators to make site specific determinations of WOTUS. The rule falls back on some of the methodologies and approaches utilized based on the 1987 rules as being familiar and established. It is important to note that the reasons for the need for the rewrite of the WOTUS rule is that too much uncertainty existed, and issues occurred relative to the discretion of the regulating agencies resulting in inconsistent application of the rule across jurisdictions. To achieve the stated goals of the rule rewrite, the new rule must provide sufficient additional specificity to avoid the historic issues.
- 4. The rule at present does not account for the historic development of stormwater systems throughout the US. Many stormwater systems have been built within historic drainageways and even high-level tributaries to receiving waters. This stormwater infrastructure has little resemblance to historic natural systems and would not support the biological and chemical conditions of jurisdictional waters. Some accounting of these conditions, through clearer definitions of exclusions, should be made under this rule.
- 5. Stormwater treatment takes many forms. It is important that these rules do not inadvertently limit innovative treatment approaches that would support achievement of the goals of the Clean Water Act. Treatment wetlands for example, provide treatment of stormwater runoff but would resemble, through their connectivity and significant nexus to receiving waters, their natural counterparts. Another aspect is the use of offline or inline regional treatment facilities which also would resemble natural waters through connectivity and would impact the chemical, physical and biological condition of downstream waters. The exclusions provided within the rule need to allow room for these and other future innovative treatment approaches that help address the difficult and costly aspects of stormwater treatment.

6. SESWA recommends that additional guidance and streamlined permitting be made available for projects that, by their nature, are located within jurisdictional waters whose sole purpose is to combat climate change through building resiliency. These projects may include wetlands expansion or restoration to naturally buffer our coastal communities, restoring floodplains and streambanks to reduce flooding, maintenance of historically impacted jurisdictional waters to restore their hydraulic capacity (canals, channelized streams, retention ponds, etc.), or integrating green stormwater infrastructure projects into our built environment per our MS4 permits.

Summary

We believe that the above recommendations and existing state regulatory regimes would serve to provide clarity and protect our surface water resources while avoiding the profound impacts that the regulations would have had on local governments and other entities subject to the NPDES and MS4 permit programs.

As always, we stand ready to answer any questions that you may have and to work with both agencies to improve water quality.

H.R. 3684 - Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act

Short Summary of subsections relating to Water Quality

Updated 11-15-21

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SEC. 11520. STORMWATER BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES. - Requires Secretary of Transportation and EPA Administrator to offer to enter into agreement with the Transportation Research Board of the National Academy of Sciences to conduct a study to estimate pollutant loads from stormwater runoff from highways and pedestrian facilities and to provide recommendations regarding the evaluation and selection by State departments of transportation of potential stormwater management and total maximum daily load compliance strategies within a watershed. Report required within 18 months.

SEC. 11522. INVASIVE PLANT ELIMINATION PROGRAM. – Establishes program to provide grants to states to eliminate or control existing invasive plants or prevent introduction of or encroachment by new invasive plants along and in areas adjacent to transportation corridor rights-of-way. Budgets \$50M per year for FY 2022 through 2026.

SEC. 50204. SEWER OVERFLOW AND STORMWATER REUSE MUNICIPAL GRANTS. – Budgets \$280M per year for FY 2022 through 2026 for CSO overflow remediation and related projects.

SEC. 50205. CLEAN WATER INFRASTRUCTURE RESILIENCY AND SUSTAINABILITY PROGRAM. – Establishes the clean water infrastructure resilience and sustainability program to award grants to eligible entities for the purpose of increasing the resilience of publicly owned treatment works to a natural hazard or cybersecurity vulnerabilities. Fund may be used for "the enhancement of stormwater management by increasing watershed preservation and protection." Budgets \$25M per year for FY 2022 through 2026.

SEC. 50210. CLEAN WATER STATE REVOLVING FUNDS. – Broadens the uses of the Clean Water SRF. Budgets \$2.4B for fiscal year 2022; \$2.75B for 2023; \$3B for 2024; and, \$3.25B for fiscal years 2025 and 2026.

SEC. 50217. STORMWATER INFRASTRUCTURE TECHNOLOGY. – Authorizes three to five Centers of Excellence for Stormwater Control Infrastructure Technologies. Provides for purpose and criteria to determine eligibility. Budgets \$5M per year for FY 2022 through 2026, and \$10M per year for SW Control Infrastructure projects.

SEC. 50218. WATER REUSE INTERAGENCY WORKING GROUP. – Directs EPA to establish a Water Reuse Interagency Working Group to develop and coordinate actions, tools, and resources to advance water reuse across the United States, including through the implementation of the February 2020 National Water Reuse Action Plan. Requires reports to be delivered to Congress.

SEC. 50219. ADVANCED CLEAN WATER TECHNOLOGIES STUDY. – Directs EPA to undertake a study that examines the state of existing and potential future technology, which enhances the treatment, monitoring, affordability, efficiency, and safety of wastewater services provided by a treatment works. Requires reports to be delivered to Congress.

SEC. 50220. CLEAN WATERSHEDS NEEDS SURVEY. – Directs EPA to complete an assessment of capital improvement needs for all projects that are eligible for assistance from State water pollution control revolving funds and to submit a report to Congress describing the results of the assessment. Allocates \$5M to complete the project.



Stormwater Infrastructure Funding Needed to Support Sustainability and Clean Water Goals

The Southeast Stormwater Association supports local governments and utilities in managing their Stormwater Programs throughout USEPA Region 4. These eight states have a variety of stormwater needs and regulatory environments. However, one thing in common for all communities is the need for a sustainable source of funding for critical stormwater infrastructure. The American Society of Civil Engineers gives stormwater infrastructure a grade of "D" noting that the performance of stormwater systems across the country is declining. Many older stormwater systems are struggling with aging and deteriorating pipelines and the high cost of retrofits needed to address urban flooding and changing weather patterns. Stormwater funding is mostly local but a federal investment of up to \$8 billion per year is needed according to a recent USEPA Task Force Report, Evaluating Stormwater Infrastructure Funding and Finance. In fact, the Task Force states: "...stormwater programs would benefit from a separate, additive, recurring financial commitment from EPA."

Stormwater infrastructure is the first line of defense for flood control, safety for roads, water quality and protection of natural resources like rivers, lakes, and wetlands. We see the threats to our society caused by inadequate stormwater infrastructure and system planning exemplified in the impacts to communities

from several recent storm events: in South Carolina hundreds of people were forced to evacuate homes; in Ellicott City, Maryland, drinking water supplies were tainted, and businesses destroyed; and in Metro Atlanta, roads and transportation systems were damaged. These are just a few recent examples of flooding and illustrate the need for our local communities to prepare for more frequent and intense storms. Communities need to prepare now to meet critical infrastructure needs in support of resiliency and water quality goals.

The USEPA Task Force concluded: "...stormwater management investment directly benefits the health, safety and economic opportunity for citizens and residents through the overall improvement of water quality and resiliency of communities."

SESWA recommends implementing several of the major recommendations from the report including:

- ✓ Develop a new and enhanced construction grant program specifically designed to support stormwater projects.
 - Similar to the successful federal Municipal Construction Grants Program that helped build the nation's water treatment infrastructure.

- ✓ Modify and increase annual funding allocations to the CWA Section 319(h) grant program to:
 - allow funds to be used to enhance local community's capacity to understand financial and organizational capacity
 - allow funds to be used for the study and implementation of stormwater utilities and the development of asset management systems.
 - remove restrictions on use of grant funds for MS4 permit compliance.
- ✓ Provide additional funds for the existing Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) and Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA) programs specifically for stormwater. Options include:
 - Create a "One Water" State Revolving Fund with amounts allocated to drinking water, clean wastewater, and stormwater.
 - Expand the existing WIFIA program to provide additional funding for stormwater projects.

✓ Provide technical assistance and funding to help communities create and maintain sustainable and legally defensible local funding sources and increase operational efficiency. This Technical Assistance and funding should support:

- need assessments
- organizational analysis
- grant applications
- affordability assessments
- integrated planning
- the development of revenue instruments such as stormwater utilities
- ✓ In support of the implementation of the above enhancements, the federal government should work towards the development of a common application for federal funding similar to what is used by hundreds of universities nationwide.

Flooding and water quality protection are critical issues, and our communities need to be prepared. Building and maintaining stormwater infrastructure is a proactive local effort that helps ensure the resiliency of those communities, and by extension, our nation.

9. <u>Litigation Update</u>

Waters of the United States

Late last year two federal courts remanded and vacated (invalidated) the 2020 Navigable Waters Protection Rule, which had significantly narrowed the definitions of Water of the United States. Vacating the 2020 rule has the effect of moving WOTUS policy back to that which existed in the early 2000's – a position embraced by the current EPA and ACOE.

In December 2021, EPA proposed a new set of WOTUS definitions. The period to submit comments on those proposed regulations ended on February 7, 2022. SESWA's comments are included in the Stormwater Policy Committee section of this packet.

On January 24, 2022, the US Supreme Court agreed to hear an appeal from a decision of the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals, centering on the fundamental question of their 2007 *Rapanos* decision. In *Sackett v. EPA*, the scope of the Clean Water Act may yet again be revised, although this time possibly backing the Sacketts' push for a narrow WOTUS definition.

Meanwhile, on March 10, 2022, the States of Ohio and Tennessee filed motions asking a federal district court to formally block any future implementation of the long-defunct Obama-era WOTUS rules, arguing that their challenge to the 2015 regulation will not be moot even if the Biden administration finalizes a new "interim" rulemaking as it plans this year. But (in record-setting time) the court on March 29, 2022, rejected the states' arguments and dismissed the case as moot, noting that "This Court does not have jurisdiction to enjoin a rule that has not been in effect for three years and that the Agencies have replaced at least twice."

SESWA is continuing to monitor the situation as it unfolds. EPA may be waiting for a decision in the *Sackett* case before releasing a final WOTUS rule.
